What are the pre-requisite requirement(s)?	Complete one Junior Journey—"Completing" a Journey means that girls earn all Journey awards, including the Take Action project. Complete one Cadette Journey—"Completing" a Journey means that girls earn all Journey awards, including the Take Action project. The Take Action project and all of the activities done with the Journey are separate from any work done on the Silver Award project.
