Adult volunteer details

Camp works best when one or two adult volunteers make the commitment to bring a troop for the week. The girls and adults benefit from the continuity, inclusivity, and strengthening of bonds formed during the year.

When you register as a volunteer, you become one of two (or more) leaders for your girl's unit. Supervising 8-12 girls with another volunteer, you will assist with scheduled activities while building your girls' creativity, confidence, and leadership ability. It is a busy and rewarding week.

Of course, everyone cannot make a five-day commitment to volunteer. However, GSWISE requires each 2 volunteers to lead each unit every day. **To meet this minimum and ensure the girls's safety, every family is required to commit an adult volunteer to camp for at least one day at registration.**

New Girl Scout volunteers must complete the background check and adult volunteer registration process (including applicable fees) through GSWISE.
