- **Opportunity**: partner with the largest organization for girls in the world with access to resources on leadership development, team building, outdoor skills, technology, and much more.

How to Become a Community Event Provider

- Complete the <u>CEP Application Form</u> at https://gswise.jotform.com/213433535149050 and receive approval.
- 2. Provide a Certificate of Liability Insurance.
 - Organizations must have at least \$1,000,000 in general liability coverage with Girl Scouts of Wisconsin Southeast named in the Certificate Holder box.

3. Provide payment for CEP year (if applicable).

Responsibilities of a Community Event Provider

- Follow Safety Activity Checkpoints for your activity. They can be found at gswise.org by doing a keyword search for Safety Activity Checkpoints. Find your activity in the Table of Contents. (Example: Animal Interaction, Swimming, or Hayrides.)

 Review the information to ensure that your activity follows the checkpoints listed.
- Ensure no drugs, smoking/vaping, or alcohol are permitted at events.
- Promote your Girl Scout event with marketing materials and participation patches. Use of the Girl Scout brand and/or logo must receive GSWISE approval.
- Handle participant registration and payment.
- Send participants a confirmation prior to the event informing guests of logistical information (where to park, what to wear, etc.).
- Provide GSWISE with participation reports monthly as requested.
- Submit a *CEP Renewal Form* annually (October 1–September 30). All programs are reviewed and evaluated each year to ensure quality of activities and services.
- Keep an up-to-date *Certificate of Liability Insurance* on file

Optional: Submit pre-scheduled event details via separate online form to request promotion on our website calendar.

Responsibilities of GSWISE

- Invoice organization for promotion fees when applicable.
- Provide timely communication of any changes to the Community Event Provider program.
- Ensure that provider information is up-to-date.
- Provide orientation to the Girl Scout program if requested.
- Provide updates when changes are made to Girl Scout national programming.
- Conduct onsite visits or background checks (at our discretion).
- Help promote community organization's opportunities as described in the next section.



Promotion Options and Fees

CEPs can reach out to Girl Scouts and troop leaders throughout the year. The following opportunities are offered to all CEPs:

- Girl Scout approved flyer posted on Girl Scouts of Wisconsin Southeast website.
- Girl Scout approved flyer posted in our Rallyhood community (an all-in-one platform for Girl Scout communication and collaboration).
- Several general CEP social posts and emails throughout the year.
- · Name listing in Girl Scout event booklets.
- Optional: Pre-scheduled events can be posted to our website calendar by submitting event details to us through a separate online form. Submit your pre-scheduled events using this form: https://gswise.jotform.com/221093799895071

As additional opportunities arise they will be communicated to CEPs via email.

Length of Agreement: The length of agreement is valid October 1 through September 30. During this time, your organization must remain in good standing.

Tiered Fees*: Payment must be submitted prior to flyer distribution and/or website advertising. Note: After April 1, fees will be prorated by 50% until September 30.

Level 1:

 Community Event Provider hosts activities that Girl Scouts can participate in as a troop or individual that fully support the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE).

Activities fulfill Girl Scout program outcomes and connect to the National Program Portfolio including Journeys and skill building badges.

Level 2:

 Community Event Provider hosts activities that Girl Scouts can participate in as a troop or individual to support the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE).

Activity is not required to connect to the National Program Portfolio, but does align with one of the focus areas—STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math), outdoors, life skills, and entrepreneurship.

Level 3:

• Community Event Provider would like to advertise to the Girl Scout membership.

Activity or event is not a specific Girl Scout opportunity, but GSWISE has approved it as a beneficial Girl Scout experience.

Flyer Development Procedures

Just like your business, we strive to maintain brand consistency, which will help uphold our brand value and protect against unauthorized, inconsistent, and unlicensed use of the Girl Scout brand.

We must approve the final version of your flyer (for text, design, and branding) before you are able to distribute or post it.

Please do the following:

- Get permission to use our official GSWISE logo. The Girl Scout servicemark is a registered trademark; permission must be granted to use it. Simply contact *customercare@gswise.org* and we will send you authorized art.
- Do not stretch, distort, or recolor the logo art.
- Make sure to put the "girl" in Girl Scout. The words "Scout," "Scouts," and "Scouting" should never appear without the modifier "Girl," and the "G" and "S" in Girl Scouts should always be capitalized.
- Keep Girl Scout references regional. Use "Girl Scouts of Wisconsin Southeast" instead of "Girl Scouts of the USA" or "Girl Scouts of America."
- Spell out "Girl Scouts." Don't abbreviate (such as "GS" or "scout").
- Do not indicate other youth serving organization names on the flyer.
- Use girl-friendly fonts and a bright color palette when possible.
- Add high resolution photos that will show up clearly on the page. (You must have approval to use photos of Girl Scouts in your flyer.)

Planning Events

Offer programs that appeal to a variety of Girl Scouts

Girl Scouts can participate in Girl Scouting as part of a troop or individually. We recommend that you design ways for both troops and individuals to participate meaningfully in your events.

You can choose your scheduling options

Community Event Providers offer events in many different ways—some offer just one event a year and some offer ongoing events that troops can schedule on demand. Some programs are for multiple grade levels, while some are for a specific grade level. Consider that Girl Scouts and troop activities generally slow down during the summer months, so if you would like to offer a summer program, offer ample time for promotion. When considering a pre-scheduled date for your event, consult with our Girl Experience Team to ensure that there is not a conflict with a previously scheduled large-scale council event or provide on-demand offerings allowing individual troops to schedule at their convenience.

Photography and video or audio recordings

If you would like to take photographs or make video or audio recordings of Girl Scouts at your events, you need to have parents or guardians sign a media release form for your organization. (Although parents or guardians sign a media release form when Girl Scouts are registered with GSUSA, it does NOT give permission to organizations other than Girl Scouts.)

Plan ahead to include a media release form, or any other permission forms, in your confirmation information.

Follow Girl Scout rules about fundraising

Girl Scout standards prohibit Girl Scouts from directly raising money on behalf of another organization, using games of chance, direct solicitation of cash, or product demonstration parties. However, Girl Scouts may help other organizations at fundraising events (i.e. handing out water at a cancer walk).

Ensuring the Safety of Girl Scouts

All Community Event Provider programs must meet or exceed Girl Scout safety standards. Make sure to review the information listed below. If you have questions contact *customercare@gswise.org*.

- Start by checking that your program matches the guidelines listed in *Safety Activity Checkpoints* at *gswise.org* by doing a keyword search for *Safety Activity Checkpoints*. Find your activity in the Table of Contents. (Example: Animal Interaction, Swimming, or Hayrides.) Review the information to ensure that your activity follows the checkpoints listed.
- If Safety Activity Checkpoints do not exist for a program you wish to provide, contact customercare@gswise.org. Some programs are allowed if additional rules are followed, while others are simply not allowed. We will let you know the details.
- Ensure that no alcohol, smoking/vaping, or drugs are permitted at events.
- Ensure proper adult supervision of girls.
- Make sure that males do not sleep in the same space as girl members during overnight events. Men may participate only if separate sleeping quarters and separate bathrooms are available for their use.

Girl Scouts welcome and serves a wide spectrum of girls and families. GSWISE does not take a position, develop materials, or allow instruction on topics related to political campaigns, sex education, and religion. Our role is to help Girl Scouts develop leadership skills that will help them make wise choices in all areas of their lives, and we believe parents/guardians are the primary sources of information on sensitive topics. If there's any uncertainty if a topic could be considered sensitive—even for some—contact GSWISE for guidance.

CEPs CANNOT provide the following programs to Girl Scouts:

- Potentially uncontrolled free-falling (bungee jumping, hang gliding, parachuting, and parasailing)
- Riding all terrain vehicles, motor bikes, and electric scooters
- Flying in non-commercial aircraft (small private planes, helicopters, sailplanes, untethered hot air balloons, and blimps)
- Outdoor trampolines, hunting, snowmobiling, zorbing, stunt skiing, and paintball tagging

NOTE:

 Horseback riding, indoor trampolining, shooting sports, and other high-risk activities are only allowed at council approved facilities.

An Introduction to the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE)

The Girl Scout program provides opportunities for Girl Scouts to be their best, to develop their leadership skills, and to make the world a better place — all within the safety of an all-girl environment where Girl Scouts take the lead, learn by doing, and learn cooperatively.

Your program will be categorized based on how it aligns with the Girl Scout Leadership Experience.

Three Keys to Leadership

These describe *what* Girl Scouts gain as a result of their experience in our program.

Discover—Girl Scouts understand themselves and their values and use their knowledge and skills to explore the world.

Connect—Girl Scouts care about, inspire, and team with others locally and globally.

Take Action—Girl Scouts make the world a better place.


Three Processes

These describe *how* Girl Scouts participate in our program.

Girl-Led means that Girl Scouts of every age take an active and age-appropriate role in figuring out the what, where, when, why, and how of what they do.

Learning by Doing is hands-on learning that engages Girl Scouts in an ongoing cycle of action and reflection. When girls actively participate in meaningful activities and later reflect on them, they get a deeper understanding of concepts and mastery of skills.

Cooperative Learning is designed to promote sharing of knowledge, skills, and learning in an atmosphere of respect and cooperation as Girl Scouts work together on goals that can only be accomplished with the help of others.



5 Ways Girl Scouts Builds Girl Leaders

Girl Scouts' mission is to build girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place. Since 1912, Girl Scouts of all backgrounds and abilities can be unapologetically themselves through Girl Scout programs as they discover their strengths and rise to meet new challenges — whether they want to climb to the top of a tree or the top of their class, lace up their boots for a hike or advocate for social justice, or make their first best friends. Backed by trusted adult volunteers, mentors, and millions of alums, Girl Scouts lead the way as they find their voices and make changes that affect the issues most important to them. These activities are designed to be girl-led, cooperative, and hands-on—processes that create high-quality experiences conducive to learning.

When Girl Scouts participate in our program, they benefit in five important ways:

STRONG SENSE OF SELF

Girl Scouts have confidence in themselves and their abilities, and form positive identities.

POSITIVE VALUES

Girl Scouts act ethically, honestly, and responsibly, and show concern for others.

CHALLENGE SEEKING

Girl Scouts take appropriate risks, try things even if they might fail, and learn from mistakes.

HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS

Girl Scouts develop and maintain healthy relationships by communicating their feelings directly and resolving conflicts constructively.

COMMUNITY PROBLEM SOLVING

Girl Scouts desire to contribute to the world in purposeful and meaningful ways, learn how to identify problems in the community, and create "action plans" to solve them.

True North Award

The True North Award allows Girl Scouts to explore their values, build courage and confidence and see how they can make an impact on the world around them.

This award is for Juniors through Ambassadors and is one of many new pre-requisites that Girl Scouts can use to begin completing their Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards.
