From Troop Leader to Day Camp Director: How Beth Inspires Local Girl Scouts

Sun Lakes Day Camp Director Beth Hahn has volunteered with Girl Scouts for more than 25 years. When her daughter first joined Girl Scouts, Beth became a troop leader. As her daughter continued bridging in Girl Scouts, Beth took on facilitator and service unit manager roles. In 2006, Beth became Director of Sun Lakes Day Camp, her favorite role.

Beth learned her leadership skills from a 4-H program, where she earned a Key Award. She incorporates those skills to create several theme-related activity stations for the campers at Sun Lakes so that they can try new activities while also learning about independence and resilience. As a volunteer Day Camp Director, she starts researching topics for the next summer's camp just three weeks after camp season ends.

"My favorite part of being Day Camp Director is watching the girls try a new activity and seeing when the light bulb goes on. When they attempt something new, fail, try again, and figure out what they did wrong and how to fix it – that is what courage and confidence are all about," said Beth.

The camp can't run smoothly without a team working together and their planning team of more than a dozen meets monthly to discuss ways to improve the camp. They also offer events throughout the year to stay engaged with the campers. Several alumni who live in other states even return to camp and

model to younger campers how much they believe in camp and the program. Beth and her team received the prestigious GSWISE President's Award in 2014 and 2023 for their outstanding teamwork and dedication.

Beth returns to Sun Lakes Day Camp every year to help Girl Scouts build confidence needed for the next stage of their lives – whether they are young campers or teen program aides. Her experience volunteering at Girl Scouts has been filled with lifelong friendships and countless learning experiences, all of which create a memorable summer camp for campers throughout the years.

Camp Alice Chester opened its doors in 1924 after a generous donation from namesake Alice Chester, the first president of the Milwaukee Girl Scout Council. The now 333-acre property provides an introduction to nature to local Girl Scouts participating in overnight and day camps.

Alice Chester's daughter, the late Marion Chester Read, and her grandchildren Alice and Ross, along with their families, have continued to pave the path for Girl Scouts of all backgrounds to realize their full potential outdoors.

"Camp Alice Chester is a place filled with opportunities for adventure, new experiences, and personal growth," said Alice Read.

"I'm proud of what my grandmother started 100 years ago. That pride grew during my own camp experiences with Girl Scouts, when I took my daughter's troop to camp. They







all returned home stronger, dirtier, and more confident," continued Alice. "It's with even greater pride that I see my grandmother's legacy continue each year as hundreds of Girl Scouts experience the wonder of the outdoors and are encouraged to look within and then live beyond expectations."

"My grandmother was motivated by the desire to help young women become strong, capable leaders by facing challenges in the natural world and beyond while in the supportive environment of camp and Girl Scouts. My family and I feel the same desire," said Alice.

One of her proudest moments was advocating to retake the swim test after initially struggling with understanding the directions. With encouragement, she approached the lifeguard to speak up and successfully retook the test. Nyla continued to blossom, participating in new ventures like fishing and even courageously trying archery, an activity only a few daring campers attended.

Girl Scouts of all ages also tapped into their inner leader throughout the week.
